## Torquay College Matrix School Wide Positive Behaviour Support



The Behaviour Matrix provides an opportunity to specifically define each of the school's behaviour expectation and standardise them. The Matrix of Expected Behaviours

- makes it clear for staff and students to know exactly what is expected across learning and other spaces around the school
- establishes a consistency of practice for adults and students across the school
- creates a school culture that is clear, positive and consistent

These are the behavioural rules that are expected in each and every school location. The Matrix explicitly teaches the skills we want students to be able to demonstrate. Our behaviour matrix displays positive language and is underpinned by the school values and guiding principles. By focusing on the school values, we support all children to be kind and successful. We recognise behaviour as a form of communication and we actively support students to modify their behaviour for social acceptance and safety.

The Behaviour Matrix is displayed with visual posters throughout the school environment. Students are acknowledged when they demonstrate the school values with verbal, non-verbal and tangibles.


